Patty's House at Englewood Metropark

Patty's House or Patty's Homestead is a location of an old building built by an original settler of the area named James Patty in 1848. Legend has it two young Patty girls were hung in a tree nearby by a vengeful relative. It is considered to be a "haunted" location by many. The three recipe items refer to three things near Patty's House while the first letter of each line of the directions spelled METROP backwards (Metropark).

Witches' Homestyle Pâté

The word 'Patty' comes from the French word 'paté' Home = Patty's Home

1 horse head

1 cup of bark from an oak tree

1 hollowed-out charred pumpkin The three items refer to things nearby Patty's House. charred pumpkin = Pumpkin Ash and Swamp Forest hollow = Patty's Hollow horse = the horse trails/parking nearby

oak = Oakview

Place pumpkin in view of oak tree overnight. Open horse's head and remove brain.

Roast bark until it turns golden brown. Take roasted bark and nestle into the folds of the

brain, then place brain inside the pumpkin. Eat and enjoy after baking for 40 minutes.

Make sure horse brain is bubbling before removing from oven.

Englewood Metropark is near Route 40

The Golden Ghost was located in a crack on the windowsill of Patty's House

Note: It's found when left on a windowsill to cool, it becomes the tastiest!
